301. SELECT THE POSITION OF THE TIE CLIP.

- a. Between the 2nd and 3rd buttons and centered.
- b. Between the 3rd and 4th buttons and centered.
- c. Between the 4th and 5th buttons and centered.

302. SELECT THE ITEMS THAT COMPRISE THE SERVICE "C" UNIFORM.

- a. Long sleeve shirt with tie, cover, socks, shoes, and trousers.
- b. Short sleeve shirt, with tie, cover, socks, shoes, and trousers.
- c. Appropriate garrison cover, Khaki short sleeve shirt, service trousers, web belt and buckle, black socks, dress shoes and ribbon.

303. SELECT WHEN THE SERVICE "C" UNIFORM IS AUTHORIZED FOR WEAR.

- a. Marine Corps Ball only.
- b. For reporting for duty ashore.
- c. For leave and liberty and Uniform of the Day.

304. SELECT THE POSITION OF THE RANK INSIGNIA ON THE ALL-WEATHER COAT.

- a. On the collar 1/4 inch in from each side bisecting the angle of the collar.
- b. On the collar 1/2 inch in from each side bisecting the angle of the collar.
- c. Placed in the eye-lets provided on the collars.

305. SELECT THE LENGTH OF THE BELT FOR THE ALL-WEATHER COAT.

- a. 1 to 1 1/2 inches beyond the left belt loop.
- b. 2 to 4 inches beyond the belt buckle.
- c. 1 to 1 1/2 inches beyond the right belt loop.

306. SELECT WHEN THE SWEATER IS AUTHORIZED FOR WEAR.

- a. During cold weather.
- b. When reporting for duty ashore.

307. SELECT THE POSITION OF THE RANK INSIGNIA WHEN WEARING THE SERVICE SWEATER.

317. SELECT THE POSITION OF THE RIBBONS ON THE DRESS BLUE 'A' UNIFORM.
